
This is not to mention the opportunities to perform in one of the college's three choirs and audition for productions as part of the all-famous Season of Shows which continues to be a success.



Kevin trained at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and the University of Leeds, and has since worked with a number of prominent theatre companies including Trestle Theatre Company and English Touring Theatre. COURSES

Within the Performing Arts Department students are able to study a range of qualifications, from BTEC to A-level, all the way up to a Higher National Certificate (HNC) qualification.

PENDLETON FUTURE PROFESSIONALS' PROGRAMME

The Pendleton Future Professionals' Programmes are a selection of elite courses of study, delivered in addition to A-level subjects on the directed study day of each week. The programmes give students the opportunity to receive one-on-one support from specialist teachers, take part in additional qualifications, apply for work placements and be considered for scholarships.

If you choose to study an A-level in drama or dance, you may be eligible for admission into the Future Creatives Programme. As part of the offer, you will be given the opportunity to attend Tap Fest UK, run by professionals within the industry, including dancers from the West End. You will also be given the opportunity to complete The Arts Award, managed by Trinity College London in association with Arts Council England.

THE CHAMBER CHOIR

The Chamber Choir was founded in 2005 and is made up of over 20 students. The choir meets every week during term time to rehearse the very best music from the Renaissance to the present day – both acappella and with our orchestra.

The choir performs annual concerts at The University of Cambridge – Girton, Clare and Queens' Colleges have all been the venues for major performances since the choir was formed.

This is proceeded by an annual residential at The University of Cambridge and masterclasses by some of the top fellows and choral trainers from the university and in the UK. The choir has toured France, Romania and extensively within the UK and performs major concerts at some of the North West's major choral venues.

THE CONTEMPORARY CHOIR


The Contemporary Choir was founded in 2006 and is also made up of over 20 singers. The choir performs pieces from the 20th and 21st century, specialising in gospel, rock and pop, metal and classical music arrangements. The pieces are arranged specifically for the vocal talents within the choir. The choir also takes part in the annual residential visit to The University of Cambridge and performs a major schedule of concerts with The Chamber Choir throughout the academic year.

THE CONSORT OF VOICES

Founded in 2014, this is a specialist choir of around 10 singers drawn from the voices of the Chamber Choir and Contemporary Choir. The choir members are extremely quick at sight-reading new material and at holding individual parts, so they have an extensive repertoire of acappella music and complex harmonic arrangements.

They perform classical, religious, musical theatre, jazz and pop music from the Arts Nova period to the present day.

THE SHAKESPEARE COMPANY

The Pendleton Shakespeare Company is an ensemble group committed to promoting the works of William Shakespeare both in college and across the local community. Since its conception, it has performed many of the Bard's most popular plays including Much Ado About Nothing, The Merchant Of Venice, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Twelfth Night and Romeo and Juliet.

In 2009 the company started to tour local schools and colleges and has grown year-on-year, giving students their first taste of the life of an actor on the road. Many years have concluded with an outdoor performance at Heaton Park.

CELEBRATING 10 YEARS OF THE ECCLESTON THEATRE

T'S BEEN 10 YEARS since Pendleton Sixth Form College's largest theatre, The Eccleston, was officially opened. To celebrate they took things back to where they began, with a performance of the world-renowned, 'Les Misérables', the first show to be performed in the theatre a decade ago.

Named after one of Salford's greatest actors, Christopher Eccleston, the 260 seat Pendleton theatre has hosted countless productions and shows.

The theatre is the setting of the college's spectacular 'Season of Shows' and has been the backdrop of everything from musicals to masterclasses, dance shows to debates, symphonies to showcases. Hundreds of students started their professional careers in this very theatre and some of the best in the business have directed productions here. It holds some of the most sophisticated technical equipment, sound and lighting apparatus, and provides the perfect setting for all of the college's performing and productions arts students to learn - whether they are centre stage, or building it.

Neil Bennett, Head of the Centre of Excellence for Performing and Production Arts at Pendleton, was involved in the initial design of The Eccleston, when he first worked for the college. He said: "I am absolutely thrilled to be able to celebrate the 10th anniversary of The Eccleston Theatre here at Pendleton - especially as I was one of the team that helped design the inner dimensions structures of the theatre and rehearsal spaces in the beginning.

"A stunning piece of musical theatre"



Neil continued: "Even more thrilling is to celebrate the anniversary with the show that opened the theatre, Les Misérables, and to celebrate 10-years since we last did it here in The Eccleston and nearly 20-years since I myself conducted it at The Point Theatre, Dublin with Colm Wilkinson as Jean Valjean.

"Our students have done a superb job and thanks to our outstanding staff who have directed, choreographed, designed sets and everything else down to technical aspects and wardrobe, it was another spectacular week of theatre at Pendleton."

The department revived the legendary musical for staff, students and the people of Salford in May of this year, exactly 10-years after its debut.

Joe Meighan, Associate Theatre Director at Pendleton, said: "After I found out that The Eccleston Theatre opened with a production of Les Misérables in 2008, I thought it would be fitting to celebrate the achievements of the Performing Arts Department, the college and the theatre by producing a brand new version of the show."



The production also marked the closing of this years Season of Shows at Pendleton, with the new season opening in September with a new cohort of students.

Freya Humberstone said: "The competition was such a great experience as it gave all of us more opportunity to get public performance practice, and also the chance to be adjudicated based on both technique and performance skills in terms of group singing."

Both choirs are run as an extra-curricular activity at Pendleton Sixth Form College and perform at numerous showcases, events and occasions. Earlier this year The Consort of Voices took to the stage at the college's annual Apprenticeship Awards during National Apprenticeship Week, and have also completed a residential at Queens College, The University of Cambridge.

IS THE PERFORMING ARTS INDUSTRY A MERITOCRACY? CELEBS AND STUDENTS DEBATE

HE WIGFIELD-TURNER, first-year BTEC Performing Arts Acting student at Pendleton Sixth Form College, pulls off not one, but two outstanding debates including students and local celebrities, Julie Hesmondhalgh and Maxine Peak.

Che, whose efforts have been described as 'outstanding' by departmental staff at the college, conducted the debates as part of the Trinity College London Arts Awards. The award will be offered to all students taking part in the Future Creatives Programme at Pendleton next year.

Students from the Performing Arts Department practised their live action debating whilst exploring the important topic, is the performing arts industry a meritocracy? A meritocracy is when a group of people have progressed and gained power based on merit, talent and ability as oppose to wealth, class or privilege.

Coronation Street's very own Hayley Cropper, real-name Julie Hesmondhalgh, joined Che and her classmates for the discussion in the college's famous Eccleston Theatre. Julie was very strongly against the argument that the industry is a meritocracy saying: "Why should some work 10 times as hard, how is that meritocracy, there is not an equal starting point."

She also made the very strong point that, "7% of the population go to fee paying, private schools. That is a tiny, tiny percentage of the population. But, 93% of British Oscar winners were privately educated".

Students for and against the statement also put forward their arguments and were given the opportunity throughout the hour-long debate to rebuttal each other. Members of the audience, which was made up of other performers from the department as well as other groups including The Politics Department and The Debating Society, were also invited to take the microphone and have their say.

Arguments for the statement, the performing arts industry is a meritocracy, included the argument that anyone who wants to do well within the industry has the opportunity to do so should they work hard and do whatever they can to achieve their goals. However the opposing team contended that drama school admission, travel to and from auditions and additional support and training is all costly, making it easier for those with more financial support to excel.

Following the successful debate earlier this year, another has been conducted since, this time with special guest Maxine Peak. Maxine was just as impressed with the debate and the students from Pendleton as Julie was and described Che as 'wonderful stating it was 'a pleasure to share the stage with you'.

REBEKKA OPDAL CHRISTIANSEN

WHY I MOVED FROM NORWAY TO STUDY AT PENDLETON PERFORMING ARTS



EBEKKA OPDAL CHRISTIANSEN had no idea what to expect when she came to study performing arts at Pendleton Sixth Form College. Having completed her auditions via video, she hadn't visited the college, or even Salford,

She said: "Pendleton was absolutely my favourite college. The course on the website, the videos, they all looked so professional and I can't believe the percentage of students that go on to great drama schools, or into the industry."

when she decided it was the place for her.

Rebekka's first experience in England, and only before moving to Swinton, Salford, was a visit to London, watching shows like the Lion King on the West End - something which fuelled her passion for performing all the more.

"The UK is so good for musical theatre and the performing arts community is much bigger. I think that's why I've never once felt homesick; I feel more like I'm coming home, coming to a family of performers.

"In Norway I almost felt lonely in my hobby. I can count on one hand the number of people my age, in my hometown, who wanted to perform musical theatre. In the UK there are hundreds of us all studying the subject!"

Rebekka was able to make her dream of studying performing arts in the UK a reality thanks to an exchange programme put on by her college in Lillehammer, and MyEducation, an organisation that offers student exchange programmes for young people. "It's normal for students in Norway to go to English speaking countries to study on an exchange programme. I really wanted to come here to improve my English, as I might decide one day to go to drama school in the UK. But also, in Norway I didn't have the opportunity to do a combination of singing, dancing and acting whilst studying. That wasn't an option as it is here.

"In Norway I felt stuck, there just wasn't the right course for me, but now I feel as though everything is right. After all, this is all I've ever wanted to do. It's my passion. Here at Pendleton, I can concentrate on performing."

After just 8-weeks on the course, and in the country, Rebekka not only felt completely at home, but also as if she has grown immensely in her field.

"I believe I have grown so much more than I ever could have in a year at home. The performing arts community and provisions here are so much bigger. In some ways Pendleton has everything universities in Norway do for the subject.

"Plus, the teachers here, they take you seriously. They know you have dreams and goals and they help you, believe in you and support you. They make sure you know it's going to be hard, but they also make it fun. Its hard work but it is worth it."

And she can't believe the opportunities she is getting at Pendleton.

"Pendleton was absolutely my favourite college. The course on the website, the videos, they all looked so professional and I can't believe the percentage of students that go on to great drama schools, or into the industry."

"I thought I was going to have to pay for training at expensive dance studios and in exclusive theatre groups to get the most out of being here and studying here, but everything is at college. There are so many opportunities; from performing in the Christmas show, to Tap Fest UK, the choir and not to mention the extensive Season of Shows you can audition to be a part of. And as long as you are open minded, and take any opportunity that comes your way, this is really the best place to be."

Rebekka still isn't sure what she wants to do after she finishes studying, but certainly feels being here now has increased the possibilities for her.


"In addition to being a professional performer I might want to be a playwright or director even – I don't know. I still don't know if I want to perform in Scandinavia or an English speaking country, but hopefully after studying here I can do either or both.

"Although, one thing I do know is musical theatre in Norway is growing and I want to take what I have learnt back there and share my knowledge with that growing community."

And as to how has she found the big move: "Manchester is the same size as Oslo, Norway's capital, so I feel like I've gone from home to home. There has been no culture shock. In the North of England, everyone is so friendly, it's an open community.

"The first day at college was scary, especially having to speak English spontaneously, but I made friends on day one.

"It's definitely been better than I expected - it couldn't be any better!"



WHO IS TOM GLYNN-CARNEY?

THE SALFORD STUDENT WHO SWAPPED THE HALLWAYS OF PENDLETON SIXTH FORM COLLEGE, FOR A CAREER ON THE BIG-SCREEN.

OM GLYNN-CARNEY, former Pendleton Performing Arts student, made his big-screen debut in the box office hit, Dunkirk. Starring alongside the likes of Tom Hardy, Harry Styles and Cillian Murphy.

Since then Tom has landed a leading role on the West End's, The Ferryman, and a starring role in the BBC military drama The Last Post.

The 23-year-old attended Cannon Slade School in Bolton before studying at Pendleton, in Salford. The model student left college with a triple distinction star in performing arts, the highest possible grade someone studying for a vocational qualification can receive. He then went on to study at the prestigious Guildhall School of Music and Drama, in London, before embarking on a successful, film, TV and theatre career.

Tom said: "I can't help but feel like I've won a lottery with every job I've had. I have learnt a lot from some of the greatest actors and directors of our generation, and to be able to say that aged just 23, is still difficult for me to comprehend."

But despite his early successes, Tom is eager to remain level-headed and close to his heritage. He said: "I hope that with a bit of northern humour and grounded, humble approach, I will continue working with my heroes and continue to have some pretty cool stories to tell." Tom's first experience in television was in a cameo role in the BBC's Casualty in 2013, but it wasn't long before he hit our big screens as Peter Dawson in Christopher Nolan's, award-winning war drama, Dunkirk.

Dunkirk grossed over \$527 million (more than £396 million) worldwide and received eight Academy Award nominations, going on to win Oscars for Best Sound Editing, Best Sound Mixing and Best Film Editing. The movie also received eight nominations at the Critic's Choice Awards, eight nominations at the British Academy Film Awards and three nominations at the Golden Globes. It has been critically acclaimed and described as one of the greatest war films ever produced.

The film, set in 1940, depicts the evacuation of Allied soldiers during World War 2, from the beaches of Dunkirk. Peter Dawson, played by Tom, is the son of Mr Dawson, portrayed by Academy and BAFTA Award winner, Sir Mark Rylance. Mr Dawson, a civilian, sets out by boat to rescue soldiers stranded at Dunkirk, with his son and their teenage friend George, in tow.

Following on from his success in Dunkirk, Tom has also taken a leading role in the West End as Shane Corcoran in the Jez Butterworth play, The Ferryman. The show opened at the Royal Court Theatre last year.

He then went on and won the Emerging Talent Award at the Evening Standard Theatre Awards for his performance in the play.

The success doesn't stop there. Filming has now commenced for the new Netflix feature film, The King. The Netflix original, based on the work of William Shakespeare, will see Tom starring alongside some of Hollywood's biggest stars including Robert Pattinson, Lily-Rose Depp and Ben Mendelsohn, with Brad Pitt amongst producers.

The young star will also play the role of Christopher Wiseman in the biographical drama of Tolkien, based on the life of Lord of the Rings writer, J.R.R Tolkien. The film, which also stars Lily Collins and Nicholas Hoult, is expected to hit big-screens later this year.



STICKING TO HIS ROOTS

Tom, who is a self-confessed 'humble Northerner', feels extremely blessed for his accomplishments so far and thanks those who have helped him along the way, including Pendleton Sixth Form College, where he studied.

He said: "I am under no illusion that I am extremely lucky and fortunate. I am immensely grateful for the people, opportunities and establishments, including Pendleton, which have assisted me in achieving some very exciting things so far.

"I have a lot to thank Pendleton Sixth Form College for. The college was largely responsible for the position I am in today. It provided me with skills I use every day, socially and professionally. I met some of my best friends at Pendleton and will always be grateful for that. "I will remain a keen supporter of it's future, growth and development."

Staff and current students from the college are extremely proud of Tom's achievements. Lucy Huntbach, Head of Performing Arts at Pendleton Sixth Form College, said: "Tom was an enthusiastic and hardworking student who grasped every opportunity to develop his skills and perfect his performance techniques.

I think A-level Dance gave me the confidence to try for these shows and succeed in auditioning. I would recommend this course as it is so personal and all the feedback and training has really helped me to better myself as a dancer."


After completing her studies at Pendleton, Jennie, a former A-level Dance student, went on to study Dance Making and Performance at Coventry University. After graduating in 2013, she then went back to her former school, Prestwich High School, to teach.

However, it wasn't long before Jennie was offered an opportunity of a lifetime. Whilst on holiday in America, she met Beyoncé's backing dancers who encouraged her to come to New York to study further. Jennie applied and was later accepted into a dance programme at the Broadway Dance Centre. She packed up and moved to the Big Apple for seven months of intensive training.

She said: "Every day I was gaining knowledge from the best of the best. I managed to do some amazing performances in New York including a performance at Symphony Space Performing Arts Centre in Manhattan and I also did a commercial with Paula Abdul in Central Park."

> On returning from America, Jennie got a job at Salford Reds as a Lead Dance Artist - teaching in schools and choreographing for school performances at half-time on match days. But this wasn't her true passion. She said: "On returning to Manchester in 2016 I decided I wanted to create my own dance school in the area in which I grew up. I wanted to give back to the children of my community and create a fun safe environment showing them that anything is possible.

> > "It's then that I started JD DANCE. We provide dance classes for children up to 16-years-old at a local community centre in Lower Broughton. We have been open for 18-months now and in that 18-months we just continue to grow bigger and bigger, currently with around 50-60 children at our school."

"But, whatever you go into, what you learn at this college is invaluable. Listen to everything your teachers say because everything you will learn on this course will set you up for the future."


It was acting teacher Gideon Clear who invited Joe in to speak, after teaching him just a handful of years ago. He wanted to show current students that getting into the industry is achievable and hoped to educate them about the different routes available to them.

Gideon said: "As a college we push progression, but there are three different types of progression. We have our own university course for those who want to continue training at Pendleton, there is university, in our case drama school, or you could go straight into work within the industry, and we push all three as viable options for students.

"Joe went straight into a career and he has done extremely well for himself, he didn't end up going to drama school neither did many other successful alumni."

Joe added: "I chose not to go to drama school. What I did, and I always believe you should do this, I followed my gut. I had these different options in front of me, but by following my gut I ended up landing a job in Emmerdale and I spent four years there."

Joe became a household name playing Finn Barton on the British soap and is now pursuing other roles.

FORMER PENDLETON PERFORMING ARTS STUDENT IS NAMED AS ONE OF MANCHESTER'S '30 UNDER 30'

AM LATHWOOD, 26, who studied musical theatre at Pendleton almost a decade ago, has been named in A Magazine's '30 UNDER 30' feature. The magazine selects 30 young people each year that they believe are the 'best of the best in our city', and Pendleton's very own Sam has made the cut for 2018.

The actor and model has come a long way since his time at Pendleton, with a successful theatre career under his belt and a part singing on the official Disney soundtrack for the upcoming movie, Mary Poppins Returns. Following his time at college he secured a place at the prestigious Arts Educational School and soon went on to perform in the West End. But, even a decade on, Sam still credits his time at Pendleton as 'the beginning' for him and gives even more recognition to the time and energy the teaching staff put into his education, which he describes as being 'worth its weight in gold'.

Here is what Sam had to say about his career, college life and this new accolade:

How does it feel to be recognised as one of Manchester's '30 UNDER 30'?

"Crazy! When I was approached I couldn't believe it. I was absolutely over the moon to have even been considered, and the reception and feedback I've received since the article was published has all been so lovely and positive."

What's been the biggest highlight from your career so far?

"I'm so lucky to say I have achieved dream jobs since graduating from The Arts Educational School, London, in 2012. Receiving the phone call from my agent offering me my first West End job in Charlie and the Chocolate Factory at The Theatre Royal



Drury Lane was pretty cool. Being able to perform back in my hometown with musicals Hairspray and Elf was also wonderful, especially having the support of family, friends and teachers in the audience. It has made me very excited about returning this year with Matilda at The Palace Theatre.

"But, I think a huge highlight was being asked to be a part of the new Disney movie Mary Poppins Returns. Getting to record an original Disney movie soundtrack with music that nobody else has heard yet was extremely special. As was finding yourself singing this music whilst sat next to Emily Blunt, Meryl Streep and an entire team from Disney. It was definitely one of those 'pinch me' moments."

How did your time at Pendleton help you get where you are today?

"Though I had danced and acted regularly from an early age, Pendleton really was the beginning. From my first induction day whilst I was still in year 11 at The Swinton High School, to the day I started the two year musical theatre course, it made me realise how much I wanted to act, sing and dance every day for the rest of my life."

What was your highlight from your time here?

"I have so many highlights from being at Pendleton, but, for me personally, it was getting to work so closely with the teachers. The staff at Pendleton gave each student something more valuable than anything else they could offer, their time. Yes there was encouragement and enthusiasm but the time and energy that was put in to helping you progress and grow was worth its weight in gold.

"Having teachers who encouraged and believed in me helped my confidence grow."

What advice would you give to one of the current students who might be looking to you for inspiration for their own career?

"I had some feedback from my first drama school audition at 17-years-old which said 'some people are born to do this, others try too hard to try to do this. Sam should consider changing his career plan to something he's better at'. My advice would be no matter what people tell you, keep doing what you're doing. If you love something enough that it's all you can see yourself doing then take all of the 'knock backs' as 'bounce backs' and spring yourself deeper into your craft. It is not a race. Don't let other people's successes damage your own journey, things happen at different times for different people and that's ok.

"Work hard, stay focused, stop worrying and always strive for more."

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
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
